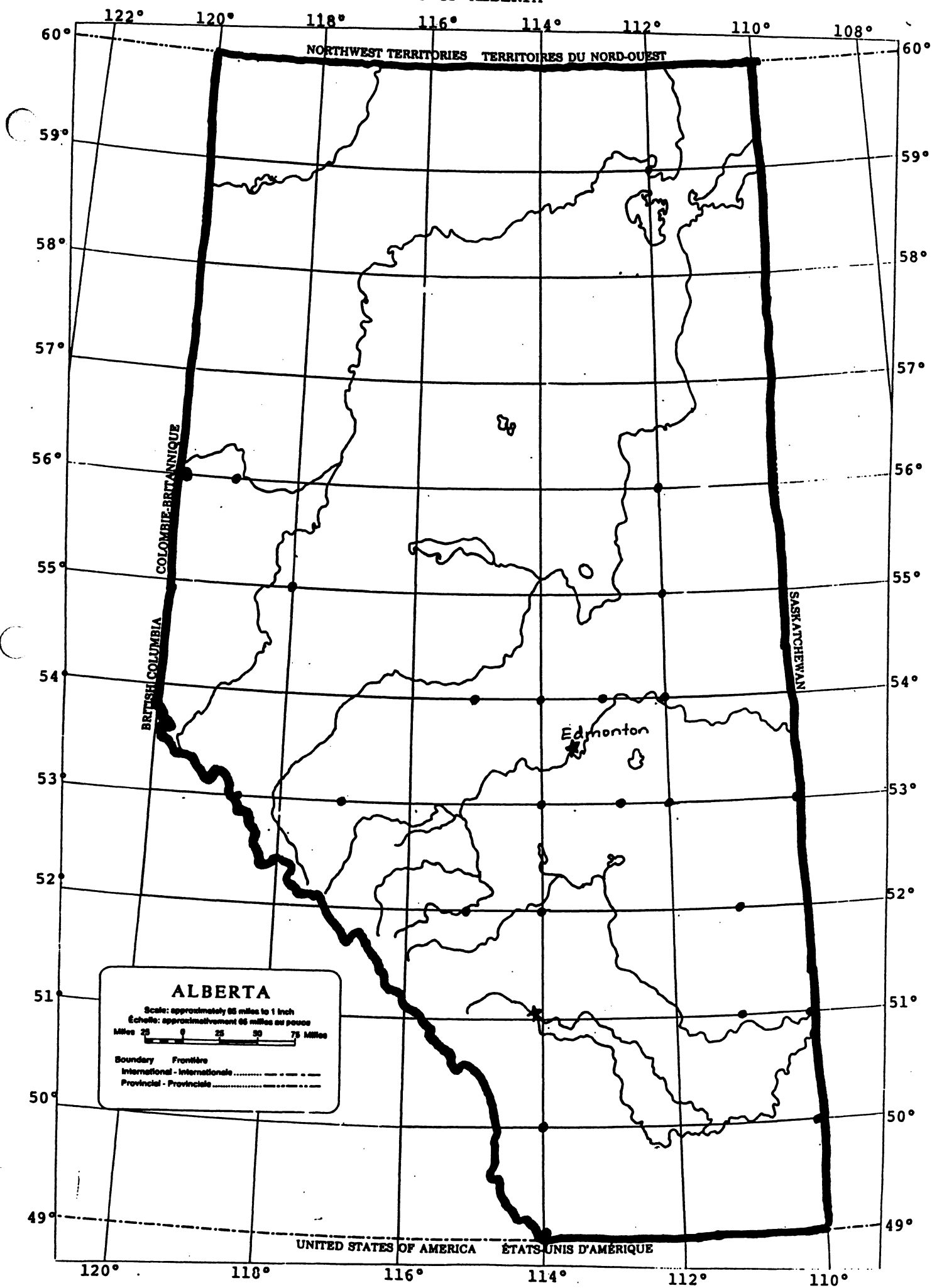


Locating Places in Alberta

Thigh Hills

- This is a hill.

Hairy Hill

- This is a mountain.
- It is named after a man who was Governor-in-chief of Canada and played an important role in the development of Confederation.
- His name is Sir Edmund Walker Head.

Belly River

- This is a lake.
- The shape of the lake resembles this body part bent at the elbow.

Mount Head

- The first settlers chose this large flat hill as the site for their new homes.
- They were puzzled because they saw large mats of hair covering the ground.
- In the spring they saw hundreds of buffalo roaming the slopes of the hill.
- The 'hairy mystery' was solved when they saw the buffalo rubbing their backs on the ground in order to loose their heavy winter coats.

Arm Lake

Kneehill

- This is a river.
- It is a translation of Blackfoot name *mokowanis*.
- The name describes the large bend or belly in the River as it turns near Lethbridge.

Hatmandu

- This is a lake.
- The Blackfoot and Cree term for this lake means 'sounding-water'.
- A legend says that the buffalo were born from the depths of the water and their births caused the strange rumbling sounds.

1) Although this body of water was named after a Lieutenant in Calgary who died during World War II, it is also the name of the colour you get when you mix black and white.

2) This hamlet's name is in French and means "Queen Mary." Mary in French is spelled Marie.

3) This body of water was named for its shape, a semicircle. It refers to an astronomical body that we can see in the sky every night.

4) This body of water was so named because two young women, Miss McLean and Miss Ellis, were not able to be found.

5) The name for this railway station refers to the Australia New Zealand Army Corps that fought in Europe during World War I. When naming the station, they used the first letter from each of these words to create its name.

6) Although named after an English newspaper, this village's name also refers to the object you look into when brushing your teeth or hair.
